An individual with **Kabuki Syndrome** may have *some* of the following signs and symptoms:

- Arched / broad eyebrows
- Long eyelashes
- Long openings of the eyelids
- Fetal finger pads
- Broadened nasal tip
- Larger cup shaped ears

- Cardiac or renal anomalies
- Hypotonia
- Feeding issues
- Developmental delay
- Hearing loss
- Frequent ear infections
